

Wysing Arts Centre announce new partners, Artist Advisor and Coordinator to deliver Syllabus VII

Wysing Arts Centre, together with Syllabus partners Eastside Projects, Spike Island and Studio Voltaire, are thrilled to announce a new chapter for the Syllabus programme, with new partners and team to deliver Syllabus VII.

Syllabus is a collaboratively produced alternative learning programme that supports ten artists each year. Over a ten-month programme, Syllabus offers time to come together with artists from across the UK to discuss ideas, work, life and approaches to practice.

In 2021, Freelands Foundation agreed a landmark £500,000 grant to fund Syllabus as part of its multimillionpound commitment to support the work of organisations addressing racial inequality in the arts.

With this grant, the future of Syllabus is secure for the next ten years and able to offer an expanded programme with three new partner institutions, New Art Exchange (Nottingham), PS<sup>2</sup> (Belfast) and TACO! (Thamesmead), each of whom bring distinct networks, expertise, practices and perspectives to the programme.

Additionally the artists will each receive a £1000 bursary to support their involvement in the programme and an access budget for those who require it.

Natasha Ruwona has been appointed as a dedicated Syllabus Coordinator and Uma Breakdown has been appointed as Artist Advisor for Syllabus VII. From June 2024, Natasha Ruwona and Uma Breakdown will work

with the artists and partner organisations to co-develop a roaming programme of intensive gatherings across the UK as well as an online programme of activity and support.

## New Partners: New Art Exchange, PS<sup>2</sup> and Taco!

New Art Exchange, Nottingham; PS<sup>2</sup>, Belfast and TACO!, Thamesmead will join existing partners Wysing Arts Centre, Cambridgeshire; Eastside Projects, Birmingham; Spike Island, Bristol; and Studio Voltaire (Associate Partner), London;. TACO! will join as the inaugural Syllabus Guest Partner.

**New Art Exchange** is the largest gallery in the UK dedicated to championing Global Ethnic Majority Voices and, under the directorship of Saad Eddine-Said, is pioneering a new model of a responsive Citizen's Gallery.

**PS**<sup>2</sup> (Paragon Studios x Project Space) is an artist-led organisation in Belfast. Drawing on their experience of delivering the Freelands Artist Development programme (2018 - 2023), PS<sup>2</sup> will, for the very first time, enable the Syllabus programme to work with artists, organisations, and other practitioners in Northern Ireland.

**TACO!** is an artist-led enquiry that provides space for research, production, and exchange. Located in Thamesmead, South East London, TACO! are appointed as a Guest Partner for Syllabus VII as part of a new commitment to invite organisations into the programme who have not historically been able to participate. This could include organisations without regular funding, those with experimental organisational structures or particularly small teams.



### Artist Advisor: Uma Breakdown

The Syllabus partners appoint artist Uma Breakdown as the Artist Advisor for Syllabus VII. The Artist Advisor is a key role in the Syllabus programme, offering mentoring, guidance and delivering activity for the ten Syllabus artists. Along with the Syllabus Coordinator, the Artist Advisor programmes the first gathering of the programme, setting the tone for each year of Syllabus.

Uma Breakdown brings a wealth of experience as an artist, writer, access consultant and educator. Uma is a disabled artist, writer, and award winning game designer interested in animals, horror, and queer feminist literature. Their appointment builds on a six-year history of working with Wysing across exhibitions, residencies, digital and with Wysing's Creative Youth Festival.

#### Syllabus Coordinator: Natasha Ruwona



Natasha Ruwona joins the Syllabus team in a new role, as Syllabus Coordinator. The main responsibilities of the Syllabus coordinator are to provide pastoral care, mentoring and central coordination of the programme.

Natasha brings experience as an artist, producer, and coordinator from ID.Y, Glasgow School of Art, Glasgow Film Festival and Buzzcut Festival.

## SYLLABUS

Syllabus is a collaboratively produced alternative learning programme in its seventh year that will support ten artists across ten months.

Syllabus offers time to come together with artists from across the UK to discuss ideas, work, life and approaches to practice.

Starting in June 2024 the Syllabus VII curriculum will be built around a series of six intensive in-person weekend gatherings and an online programme, which the ten selected artists will collaboratively develop with curators and artists who work with the partner organisations, the Syllabus Coordinator and this year's Artist Advisor.

Syllabus VII is led by Wysing Arts Centre and jointly delivered with Eastside Projects, New Art Exchange, PS2, Spike Island, Studio Voltaire and TACO!. Syllabus is funded by Freelands Foundation and Arts Council England.

### **ARTIST ADVISOR BIOGRAPHY**

**Uma Breakdown** is a disabled artist, writer, and award winning game designer interested in animals, horror, and queer feminist literature. Everything they make is about some combination of love, grief, hallucination, and an excess of joy. We welcome audiences and artists to our city-centre Project Space: an extension of the studios which offers an open, temporary gallery for experimental enquiries. We also undertake creative projects offsite in urban, suburban and rural locations throughout Northern Ireland, including PeasPark: our outdoor community garden and art project in North Belfast.

#### Spike Island, Bristol

Spike Island supports, produces and presents contemporary art and culture across an 80,000 square foot former industrial building in Bristol. Its diverse artistic programme includes free major exhibitions, events and engagement activities taking place on-site and online. Championing outstanding work by emerging and underrepresented local, national and international artists, the programme enhances access to contemporary art for audiences from all backgrounds.

Alongside its public offer, Spike Island directly supports artists through new commissions, over 70 subsidised studios, and sector-leading artist development opportunities that widen access to its programme and facilities. Its Exhibition Services business supports the bespoke production and installation of artists' film and video throughout the UK and internationally.
