Introduction

Assembly Belfast: Who cares? This gently provocative title frames the talks, screenings, panels, workshops, and Q&As that make up the first a-n Assembly in Northern Ireland. Our place, slightly hidden on an island on the periphery of the UK, often feels adrift from our neighbours' prevailing cultural ecologies.

Wednesday 4 October - pre-Assembly - online: An introduction to the visual art landscape of Northern Ireland, opening opportunities for interest and exchange for artists in the UK and Ireland.

Thursday 5 October - Assembly - in person: Artists, curators and organisations will speak about how they adapt, cope, struggle or fail in an arts-rich but resource-poor climate. Through conversation, we will nurture similarities and inspiration, helping us to generate answers to questions around how we improve the arts ecology in Northern Ireland.

Friday 6 October - post-Assembly - in person: We will take stock and develop a plan of action, proposing new programmes and a timeline, to support the survival of the arts in Northern Ireland.

<u>PS</u>² = Paragon Studios + Project Space. PS² is an artist-led collective, connecting art and society, in the centre of Belfast. We undertake projects both onsite, in our Project Space and offsite - in urban, suburban and rural locations - to enable the public to enjoy and participate in art and their locale. Artist and sector development is a big part of our work. We have ten artists' studio spaces; three annual in-residence programmes for curators, writers and collectives; a range of artist development opportunities including the Freelands Artist Programme; and are host to some 30 project artists each year for exhibitions and events.

<u>Catalyst Arts</u> is an artist-led, members-based organisation, which produces an annual exhibition and programme which has been instrumental in launching the careers of many artists.

QSS (formerly Queen Street Studios) was established in 1984, and is the longest-running studio organisation in Belfast. Located in the east of the city, QSS offers 48 self-contained studios for professional artists, as well as two large and fully accessible galleries, showcasing work by studio members and artists selected through open submission.

<u>Vault Artist Studios</u> is an artist-led, not-for-profit arts charity with an active community of over 100 members across two sites and many different artforms.

<u>a-n</u> is the largest artists' membership organisation in the UK with over 30,000 members. We support artists and those who work with them in many practical ways, acting on behalf of our membership and the visual arts sector to improve artists' livelihoods.
